PUNCTUATION MARK FOR BYU FOOTBALL RECRUITING

BYU football recruiting is a never ending story, but occasionally, you can find a place to put a punctuation mark in a paragraph detailing the pursuit of players.

BYU and Bronco Mendenhall did just that when they announced with an exclamation point 21 new football signees that inked letters of intent with the Cougars.

It is a class that, in our opinion, will keep BYU at the forefront of the Mountain West Conference and also keep the Cougars on the periphery of the BCS big boys.

Until BYU can find more players with more speed, it will remain that way.

Recruiting Recap

*Star Power...*For a coach who repeatedly says that he doesn't read newspapers or listen to media reports about his team and recruiting, Bronco Mendenhall always seems to have a nice power point presentation to refute what is being said in the media and on the web.

This time it was a defense of BYU's lack of "recruiting stars" assigned to Cougar signees.

*Speaking of Stars, It Is What It Is...*It is just our opinion, but Mendenhall's anti-star rhetoric concerning recruiting may have been related to the fact that almost all of the LDS recruits with the most recruiting stars, did not sign with the Cougars.

You can always come up with an excuse why they didn't sign, but once again, if a kid is considered big-time in the recruiting world, he is much more likely to sign with a BCS school. Empirically, you just

can't refute the evidence of the last decade and longer.

With all due respect to Bronco and his disdain for stars, here is where the big-name and well-starred LDS recruits signed:

Bronco's logic of not needing recruits with lots of stars to win is commendable and well documented with BYU's 22-2 record of the last two seasons. How can you argue with that?

How about with the fact that 16 of those 22 wins came against teams in the MWC that have recruits that have even less stars than BYU has. Two more of those 22 wins came against Utah State and Eastern Washington. They can't even spell "star" at those schools.

Win 16 of 22 games in a BCS league and you have something to talk about. Heck, win 11 of 22 games against a BCS conference schedule and we are all for the power point presentation.

If the criterion in recruiting is winning the MWC, BYU should be ecstatic.

If the goal is to be competitive outside of the MWC, however, and win at least 50% of your games against teams from BCS conferences, then, in our opinion, stars and speed really do matter in recruiting.

We were hoping that Mitt Romney would win the Republican nomination for President. His power point presentations were stunning and spectacular in the MWC states of Utah, Colorado, Wyoming and Montana. Unfortunately, the race was decided by BCS states like Florida, Illinois, New York and California.

Delegates and defeats in football don't lie. Despite what we wish would happen, Romney and BYU football are still not yet beyond being provincial powerhouses.

We want to believe that BYU can compete against the BCS big boys. But like a political campaign, you can spin it all you want, but without the numbers, you have nothing.

In the last 10 seasons, BYU is 12-20 against teams from BCS conferences. Of those teams the Cougars have faced, with the exception of USC, none have been upper tier teams in their leagues when the game was played. Remember, BYU gets the fourth and fifth place BCS teams in their bowl games

In the last three years under Mendenhall, BYU is 3-6 against BCS teams.

We like the direction of BYU football and love the job Mendenhall is doing, but so far, the recruiting spin still doesn't match the actual BCS defeats count.

Again, in our opinion, BYU had a spectacular recruiting class for what they are; an upper tier, non-BCS school.

We like winning the MWC and this class will keep the Cougars doing just that.

But BYU still needs more high quality athletes if they are going to compete consistently with BCS conferences.

Despite the power point presentations, the tell tale sign for us that BYU is not one of the big boys yet is that they are touting a kicker as their top get. And in case you forgot, BYU's best player and quarterback last season was recycled from ASU, a BCS conference school.

Mendenhall may not need more recruiting stars on his list, but he will need more athletes with better skills and more speed to be a consistent national player. The record against BCS schools doesn't lie.

When an LDS athlete that is BCS quality comes along, you consistently have to sign your share of that group. If you don't, you are consistently going to continue losing to the BCS schools that land

them.

We are all for BYU going 12-0 next year. They should be favored on paper in all MWC games next season. They should have a legitimate chance against two lower tier teams from the Pac 10 in UCLA and Washington. They can handle Utah State and Northern Iowa.

That would make us happy, but it wouldn't prove us wrong.

Show us a minimum of a .500 record against BCS teams over the next five years utilizing BYU's recruiting classes and we will let any and all Cougar fans pummel us with a power point presentation for as long as they want.

Recruiting Fluff and Stuff

*Missionaries...*Five of the 21 recently signed recruits intend to serve LDS missions before enrolling in school. They are: Austin Holt, Jake Murphy, Kevan Bills, Michael Yeck and Spencer Hadley.

*Readin' Writin' and You Do the 'Rithmetic...*Twenty percent of this class still has to clear some academic hurdles before being allowed to enroll in school. Those who still have academic work to complete or tests to take and pass include: O'Neill Chambers, Seta Pohahau, Atem Bol and Bernard Afutiti.

*Speaking of Afutiti...*He was the surprise recruit of the class. BYU went after him years ago out of high school, but he had academic issues then. He signed at San Jose State, but couldn't matriculate there either. There is no question that he is a talented player, but history has shown that there is a question on his achieving academic eligibility.

*Quarterbacks...*BYU did offer Kevin Prince, but he said no and then tore his knee and didn't play this past season. He signed at UCLA and will go on an LDS mission before enrolling at Westwood.

BYU did not sign a qb this year. They have lost Jason Munns and James Lark to LDS missions, but still have Max Hall and Brenden Gaskins returning.

Stephen Covey will be the No. 3 qb on the depth chart this spring. He has returned from his mission and will play where we thought he had the most ability. This kid is a playmaker.

He returned from his mission with some health issues, but reports we get indicate that he has resolved those issues. He will be a redshirt freshman.

*Early Start For Next Year...*BYU already has four commitments for their next recruiting class. Bronco Mendenhall has offered Adam Timo, 6-1, 175, RB; Craig Bills, 6-2, 200, DB; Jray Galea'i, 6-0, 170, DB and Terry Alletto, 6-3, 260, OL. All will be seniors this fall and said they will sign with BYU.

These prospects were offered last spring and summer.

If Bronco wants to accelerate the recruiting clock even more, it would make Tevita Ofahengaue absolutely relevant.

In case you forgot, Ofahengaue was a tight end with BYU who was the last player taken in the 2001 draft. Consequently, he gained the customary nickname of Mr. Irrelevant.

While he was playing for BYU he was married and had four children.

Which brings us back again to offering early scholarships. We don't know if this guy is on the BYU early recruiting radar screen, but we are willing to bet that he will be.

BYU ALONE IN FIRST PLACE IN MWC

Thanks to a timely 83-72 win over TCU Wednesday night in the Marriott Center and a UNLV loss to Utah in Salt Lake City the same evening, BYU now finds itself all alone atop the MWC basketball standings with a 7-1 league record.

UNLV slips into a two-way tie for second place with San Diego State. The Aztecs and Rebels both have 6-2 records.

The Cougars, who are 18-5 overall, have now won six consecutive conference games. Their latest victory was accomplished without much scoring from Lee Cummond, who is BYU's leading scorer. He was held to just 4 points and had just 4 shots in the game.

Trent Plaisted led all scorers with 27 points. He was 7-of-9 from the free throw line, which is a marked improvement from his earlier outings at the charity stripe. Jonathan Tavernari added 20 points to the Cougar cause.

The Cougars will not play until next Wednesday when they travel to Colorado State to face the Rams in the second go-round of conference action.

BYU will get Air Force, Utah, Wyoming and UNLV at home during their last eight games and face road games against New Mexico, SDSU, TCU in addition to the upcoming CSU contest in Fort Collins.
